Restoration and Framing of the Painting Attack on the Huguenots Complete! Now on display at the Prescott Library at VMI

Huzzah! The conservation and framing of the William D. Washington painting "Attack on the Huguenots," has been completed and the

work is on public display at the Preston Library at VMI in Lexington, VA. The painting depicts the March 1, 1562, massacre of over 60 Huguenots while attending services in Wassy, France.

This project has been in the works for over three years, from the time Col. Gibson first came to make a

presentation to our Society in Gordonsville to a wrap up meeting with Col. Gibson giving a presentation at our Fall meeting on Oct. 30. He gave an informative presentation, complete with slides, outlining the history of the painting with

previous owners, the background of the artist, his training and work, and his time at Virginia Military Institute. Col Gibson went on to discuss the excellent composition of the picture showing how Washington used triangulation

and lighting to emphasize the subjects and the theme of the work. Before and after pictures were shown, the difference is amazing.





Be proud of our Society for picking up this project and supplying the necessary funding to see it to this excellent conclusion. Still to be done: Improved lighting, a security barrier, a new plaque as the current one is too small for the size of the frame, and an interpretive sign to explain the context of the painting

& the artist. These final touches should be completed by the end of the year.

We hope to be able to hold our Spring meeting at VMI and to view the work in location. Please hold Saturday March 26, 2022 open and be planning to attend

this exciting meeting. Spend the weekend in Lexington & surrounds, there are many interesting places to visit & sights to see. More on this as it develops.

Many facts about the history of the painting were brought to light, and the project is now fully completed, with a period-compatible frame on which is mounted a plaque acknowledging the Virginia Huguenot Society's participation in this most worthwhile endeavor.

The painting is now displayed in a position of prominence at VMI's Preston Library in Lexington, Virginia. We may organize a future meeting in the area for members to have a firsthand look.

Many thanks to Gerald Runyan for his able assistance on the Year Book, and maximum kudos to Constance Paradiso for her diligent and conscientious efforts in putting together our Fall Meeting. David LeGrande has expanded the VHS Library, Ann Darst has kept our accounts straight, and Nancy Agee enables us to keep track of what goes on in Council and Gen-

eral Meetings. These are all important functions for which VHS is most grateful. We now have well over fifty members.

Also, on October 2, I presented the VHS wreath at the opening of the James Monroe Birthplace House in Colonial Beach, VA. This handsome portrait is of Joseph Wilkins. He is Ann Darst's great, great-grandfather. The portrait hung over the fireplace in Ann's parents home. It is now hanging in Ann's daughter's home in Richmond.

Joseph Wilkins was born in Annapolis, MD on April 7, 1782 and died in Baltimore on July 21, 1850. He is buried in Green Mount Cemetery. Wilkins was a successful merchant in Baltimore and married Mary Cooke Bedford. The oil painting is thought to be by James Hubard though it is not signed. Hubard did one of his daughter that is signed and it is in the same style.

Their daughter, Ellen, married Christopher Quarles Tompkins, who was a Colonel in the CSA. Ellen was quite an author and wrote many books. (Some of her books are for sale on Ama-



zon!). Continuing the family of Wilkins - Christopher Q. Tompkins was the brother of Capt. Sally Tompkins, the only woman to be commissioned Captain by Jefferson Davis. He did so because of her hard work and success of a hospital she operated during the War. There is a Wikipedia article on her if you want more details.

Ann had the painting restored at the Richmond Conservation Studio. Look closely at the frame, it is quite elaborate. The staff at the RCS seemed to be more interested in the frame than the painting!

Lida Archbell Overton, 102, of Newport News, Virginia, passed away Tuesday, November 9, 2021.

Lida was born in Washington, NC, February 24, 1919. She was the daughter of the late Charles Carney Archbell and Belva Agnes Ross Arch-

bell of Aurora, NC. She was a longtime member of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church and Circle #3 of The Women of the Church.

She had a wide range of interests including gardening, propagation of plants and history. For many years after her retirement, she enriched her life, family, and friends by doing extensive genealogy research and compiled a large library of documentation. She was a member of Charles Parish Chapter of National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, serving as Regent for three years: Tidewater Regents Club; Virginia Huguenot Society; Colonial Dames of Seventeenth Century; Tidewater Genealogical Society; United States Daughters of the War of 1812; Daughters of American Colonists, Fort Henry Chapter, VA; and Order of First Families of North Carolina. She also was a past member of Woman's Club of Hilton Village. She led a long, fruitful and healthy life and remained intellectually bright.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Jay B. Overton, son, Joseph A. Overton, and grandson Matthew Weiss. She is survived by many children including fourteen greatgrandchildren, and one great-great granddaughter.

A service was held on November 15, 2021, at St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Newport News, VA. In lieu of flowers, contributions may be made to St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, 45 Main Street, Newport News, VA 23601 or to a favorite charity.

Looking for Books on the History of the Huguenots?

It depends on how specialized you want to get. You could start with general books such as D'Aubigne's *History of the Reformation*; Wylie's *History of Protestantism*; or Schaff's *History of the Christian Church* and focus on the history of France.

A short and readable guide to the Huguenots is Janet Gray's *The French Huguenots: Anatomy of Courage*. There is also O.I.A. Roche's *The Days of the Upright, A History of the Huguenots*. (this one is an excellent primer and very readable.)

The standard work on Huguenots who came to America is Charles Baird's *History of the Huguenot Emigration to America*. There is also *Pioneers of France in the New World* by Francis Parkman and *The French Blood in America* by Lucian J. Fosdick.

The Edict of Nantes, ed. by Richard Goodbar

The Huguenots of London by Robin Gwynn

Other Books of Interest on Virginia Huguenots

Our Historian/Librarian, David LeGrande, has visited the Goochland Historical Society (goochlandhistory.org) in Goochland and has found the following books relating to Huguenots and Huguenot history. Thank you, David, for keeping a sharp eye out for information about the Huguenots!

Huguenot Books in the Goochland Historical Society

1. *Huguenot Refugees in Settling of Colonial America*, Copyright 1985, published by The Huguenot Society of America, NY, NY. First chapter of the book begins with the development of the Reformation in France. The following 14 chapters detail the development of Huguenot settlements in Colonial America. Several authors have focused on the economic motives that prompted many colonists to migrate to North America.

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Insignia of the Huguenot Society

The Huguenot Cross has eight points which stand for the Beatitudes from the Book of Matthew in the New Testament. Between each arm of the cross is a fleur-de-lis or lily, representing purity.

Suspended from the bottom is a dove signifying the Holy Spirit. The Huguenot Cross was designed and first manufactured in 1688.

Documents Relating to the Huguenot Emigration To Virginia and To The Settlement at Manikintown, edited and compiled for Virginia Historical Society, originally published 1886, Richmond, VA, Genealogical Publishing Co. 1962: Beginning with proposals submitted by William Byrd to the Lords of Council of Trade and Plantations for sending French Protestants to Virginia. The book continues with distribution of land to Huguenot settlers and details of their lives.
- 3. *Library of the Huguenot Society of America*, 2nd Edition; compiled by Julia M. Morand; published by Genealogical Publishing Co. Inc. Baltimore, MD, 1971: A collection that has been classified with reference to the emigration and various settlements of the Huguenots and with their regard to their influence upon commercial, religious and social life of the various countries where they found refuge.

There are three more books in their library that David did not have time to review. *Huguenot Emigration to Virginia and to the Settlement of Manikintowne*, by R.A. Brock. *Master Index to The Huguenots* and *Index to Vestry Book of King William Parish, Virginia*; editors: Langston James

Goree, Janice Curtis Pampell, published: Family History Foundation 1986. *A Brief History of The Huguenots and Three Family Trees, Chastain, Lockridge and Stockton*; by James Garvin Chastain DD, published 1933.
